

Let's Get Moving Indiana

State Agencies are Working Together to Create a More Active State

State government, like other large institutions, sometimes tend to provide its services in silos that are defined by specific tasks that each department performs. For the last eight years, three departments in Indiana state government have committed themselves to working together to break down those silos and make Indiana a safer place for people to walk, roll, and ride a bike.

The leadership of the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT), Indiana Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), and Indiana Department of Health (IDOH) have signed a Memorandum of Understanding to work together in creating safe, activity-friendly routes to everyday destinations for Hoosiers. Employees of the three state agencies convene a monthly meeting that includes the Indiana Destination Development Corporation, Purdue Local Transportation Assistance Program (LTAP), Health by Design, Bicycle Indiana, and others to discuss ongoing programs and projects.

The group has been meeting regularly for over eight years, utilizing shared funding to help Indiana communities create action plans, adopt policies, and implement grant programs that help create active communities. Some of the accomplishments of the group include:

- Assisting INDOT with writing and reviewing the state's first active transportation plan;
- Helping IDNR to review applications, promote, and administer the Next Level Trails grant program;
- Facilitating community active living workshops to help residents create action plans to implement safe places to walk, bike and be physically active outdoors;
- Providing input into Indiana's Strategic Highway Safety Plan;
- Providing technical assistance to communities implementing safe routes to schools;
- Preparing and publishing the Indiana Bicycle and Pedestrian Crash Analysis; and
- Offering technical assistance to communities in creating and implementing complete streets policies.

The work of the multi-agency group became even more important during the COVID-19 pandemic.

People around the state were going outside in record numbers, and they needed safe places to be physically active. In 2020, the group used its combined funding to offer competitive grants to four communities to draft and adopt community-wide bicycle and pedestrian plans. The City of Jasper/Dubois County, Gary, Greensburg, and West Lafayette/Tippecanoe County created advisory committees, conducted public workshops, and formally adopted their plans.

This group of dedicated professionals is continuously looking for new ways to serve Indiana residents by addressing emerging trends in providing Hoosiers safe ways to actively move around their communities.

What's Active Transportation?

Definition: human-powered mobility, such as biking, walking, or rolling (US Department of Energy)

Also called: soft mobility, active travel, active transport or active mobility

Types of active transportation: walking, bicycling, roller-skating, running, rowing, kick-scootering

Benefits of active transportation: improved quality of life, reduced energy consumption and production, reduced urban traffic, reduced air pollution, increased accessibility and safety in low-income neighborhoods, increased tourism and walkable downtowns

How can transportation agencies support active transportation?

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, transportation agencies can do the following the support active transportation:

- Reducing distances between key destinations
- Improving and providing bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- Improving public transportation (although not a form of active transportation, public transportation is always a multi-modal activity)
- Enhancing mixed-use neighborhoods

In White County IN, the process of removing and installing salt spreaders on snowplows was resulting in damage to the spreaders lights, hydraulic hoses, framing, and spinners. To improve this process, the White County Highway Department welded two hooks and added a chain to hang the salt spreader to the front of the plow. According to Mike Kyburz with White County, IN Highway Department, the greatest challenges were "finding the right length of chain per different sander models, changing the way employees think, and keeping plows and sanders together all the time."

It is estimated that with a \$200 investment in the hooks and chains, the county can save \$17,500 annually on damage repairs to the salt spreader. Mike's advice to other agencies is to simply "think outside the box." He says, "the innovation saved lots of valuable storage space and makes us a better steward of taxpayer money by keeping equipment in good condition."








Snowplow Roadeo
