

The recruiting process is a vital part of a successful intercollegiate athletics program and the vast majority of coaches and member institutions diligently adhere to ethical recruiting practices. While the rules, which govern this process, may appear complicated at times, these rules have been put in place to assure that all institutions have a fair and equal chance to promote their academic and athletic programs to prospective student-athletes. Purdue University operates by the rules. This section provides a quick reference to important issues related to recruiting.

Who is eligible to recruit...

Coaches

May recruit on- and off-campus in their sports, as long as all activities identified as recruitment occurs during permissible time periods.

Off-Campus Recruiting

In-person off-campus recruiting is limited to authorized athletics staff members and limitations may be placed on the number of staff members who are permitted to recruit off-campus (Bylaw 13.1.2.1.1).

Only those coaches who are counted by the institution within the numerical limitations on full-time head and assistant coaches may contact or evaluate prospective student-athletes off-campus. In addition, there is a limit of seven coaches (including the head coach) who may contact or evaluate prospective student-athletes off-campus at any one time (Bylaw 11.7.2.2).

Division I Football & Basketball

Only the head coach and/or assistant coaches may recruit PSAs off-campus.

Time Periods for Telephone Calls and Contacts

Telephone calls or in-person, off-campus recruiting contacts **shall not be made** with a PSA or the relatives or legal guardians prior to July 1 (September 1 in football and June 21 in basketball) following the PSA's completion of the junior year in high school. In men's basketball, it is permissible to make one (1) in-person, off-campus recruiting contact with a prospect or a prospect's relatives or legal guardians in April during the prospect's junior year in high school.

In Divisions I-A and I-AA football and basketball, such contacts are confined to specific contact periods. In all sports, time periods are established during which no on- or off-campus contacts are permitted (Bylaw 30.11.3).

Official Visit Exception

Staff members may make unlimited telephone calls to a PSA **during the five (5) days immediately preceding** the prospects official visit to campus (Bylaw 13.1.3.3.1).

If the official visit is cancelled for any reason, notify the compliance office of any excess telephone calls to the prospect prior to the official visit.

In all Division I sports, time periods (i.e., Dead Period) are set during which **"NO" on- or off-campus contacts are permitted.**

Enrolled student-athletes (or other enrolled students **"may not"** make or participate in a telephone call to prospects at the direction of a coaching staff member or a call financed by the institution or a **representative of its athletics interest** (Bylaw 13.02.5.2b).

Athletics Department Staff

Staff other than coaches may not recruit off-campus. Athletics staff may write to prospects, and may telephone PSAs after July 1 following the PSA's junior year in high school.

In Division I-A football, the content of all general recruiting correspondence to prospects (or prospects parents or legal guardians) must be prepared by the head coach or one of the full-time assistant coaches. It is not permissible for an institution's chief executive officer or director of athletics to prepare general correspondence to football prospects.

Faculty Members

May contact PSA's only on campus. Faculty may write and telephone prospects within the same NCAA limits for coaches.

Student-Athletes(SA)

Currently enrolled SAs may host PSA on campus during official visits, may write to them (not under coaches direction) and may come into contact with a PSA off-campus as long as it is incidental and not directed by members of the coaching staff and/or for recruiting purposes. SAs may not make phone calls to PSA at the direction of the coaching staff or financed by the institution.

Boosters (Representatives of Athletics Interest)

Are **prohibited** from being involved in recruiting activities. They cannot make in-person ON-or OFF-campus recruiting contact; **they cannot write or telephone** PSAs or their relatives, or legal guardians. They **may not contact** prospects coaches, principals, or guidance counselors in an attempt to evaluate a PSA (Bylaw 13.1.2). They **cannot** visit schools to pick up transcripts or film (videotapes) related to the evaluation of academic or athletic ability (Bylaw 13.1.2.4.d).

Contacts and Evaluations

NCAA regulations place restrictions on the contact and/or evaluation of PSAs. Any coach having any contact with or evaluating a PSA is "required" to complete form PC: 13.1.

Contactable Prospects

High School Prospects (9th through 12th graders): Student-Athletes in high school may be contacted by telephone or in person as of July 1, following the completion of their junior year (Bylaw 13.01.6). In the sport of Division I-A football, one telephone call to a prospect (or a prospect's relatives or legal guardians) may be made during the month of May of the prospect's junior year in high school. In other sports, one call is allowed in March of a prospect's junior year (Bylaw 13.1.3.1).

Additional telephone calls to a prospect (or a prospect's relatives or legal guardians) may not be made prior to September 1 of the beginning of the prospect's senior year in high school; thereafter, such telephone contact is limited to once per week outside of a contact period. Recruiting materials may not be provided to PSA until September 1 at the beginning of the PSA's junior year in high school (Bylaw 13.4.1).

Two-year college Prospects: Enrolled junior college SAs may be contacted in their first year, if the prospect was a qualifier at the time of high school graduation. A PSA who was a non-qualifier (Bylaw 14.02.9.3) and who is enrolled in the first of a 2 year college may not be contacted in person on or off an institution's campus for recruiting purposes (Bylaw 13.1.1.2).

Four-year college Prospects: An athletic staff member may not make contact with the SA of another 4-year collegiate institution, directly or indirectly, without first obtaining the written permission of the first institution's athletics director (or his/ her designee) (Bylaw 13.1.1.3).

Permissible Number of Contacts (Bylaw 13.1.6)

Sports other than football and basketball are allowed three (3) in-person, off-campus contacts, any site.

Men's Basketball is allowed a limit of seven (7) "recruiting opportunities" (contacts & evaluations combined) per prospect, of which not more than three (3) may be in-person, off-campus contacts (Bylaw 13.1.6.3).

Women's Basketball is allowed five (5) "recruiting opportunities" (contacts and evaluations combined) per prospective student-athlete but may not include more than three (3) in-person, off-campus contacts (Bylaw 13.1.6.4).

Division I Football is allowed six (6) in-person, off-campus contacts, any site. Contact with a PSA at any site counts. This includes contacts with relatives or legal guardians (Bylaw 13.1.6.2).

Contact during an official visit does not count in the limit (Bylaw 13.6).

A visit to a PSA's educational institution (basketball & football) may take place no more than one occasion during a particular week within a contact period, regardless of the number of prospects enrolled in the institution or whether any PSA is contacted on that occasion (Bylaw 13.1.5.1).

Any visit to a PSA's educational institution during the academic day requires a coach having approval from the executive officer (or the officer's designated representative). This applies to all sports (Bylaw 13.1.5.1.1).

"OBSERVING" a contest or practice during the contact period shall count as a contact (Bylaws 13.02.3.1, 13.1.8.9).

Restrictions on Contacts (Bylaw 13.1.7)

No recruiting contact at practice or competition site (Bylaw 13.1.7.2).

No contact with PSA prior to contest on day or days of competition.

Contact shall not be made at competition until PSA is released by high school official.

No contact with PSA at competition that requires more than one day (tournament), until the PSA's final contest is completed and he/she is released by the appropriate institutional authority and leaves the dressing and meeting facility.

Evaluation Limits (Bylaw 13.1.8.3)

Sports other than football & basketball — Four (4) evaluations during the academic year.

Basketball — Five (5) "Recruiting Opportunities" (see evaluation above). Each institution is limited to 40 evaluation days (Bylaw 13.1.8.8).

Football — Limit of three (3) evaluations during academic year not more than 1 evaluation during fall evaluation period not more than two (2) evaluations during May evaluation period (one academic & one athletic).

A visit (without contact) by a coaching staff member to a prospect's educational institution counts as an evaluation for all prospects in that sport at that educational institution (Bylaw 13.1.8.1).

Any number of evaluations made during the same calendar day (12:01 a.m. to Midnight) count as one evaluation (Bylaw 13.1.8.7).

Evaluation Notes (Bylaw 13.1.8)

Evaluations are "sport specific" (Bylaw 13.1.8.2).

Cross Country & Track - A PSA being recruited by both sports may be evaluated not more than four occasions (Bylaw 13.1.8.2.1).

Evaluations in Team Sports - In team sports, an institution shall use an evaluation for each prospective student-athlete participating in a practice or contest observed by the institution's coach, even if a contact is made during the same day. An institution's coach who is attending an event in which prospective student-athletes from multiple educational institutions participate in drills (e.g., combine) shall use an evaluation only for each prospective student-athlete participating in the event that the coach observes engaging in the drills (Bylaw 13.1.8.10).

Evaluations in Individual Sports - An institution's coach who is attending a practice or event in which prospective student-athletes from multiple institutions participated in drills (e.g., combine) or competition in an individual sport on a

specific day shall use an evaluation only for those participants that the coach observes engaging in practice or competition and the evaluation is counted even if a contact is made during the same day (Bylaw 13.1.8.13).

Football coaches may not visit a PSA's educational institution on more than one calendar day during the May evaluation period (Bylaw 13.1.8.5.2).

There is no limit on the number of evaluations following the signing of an NLI (Or written commitment) (Bylaw 13.1.8.12).

Noteworthy Restrictions

A coach may not visit a PSA's school more than once a week during a contact period (Bylaw 13.1.6.8a). All visits to a school must receive approval from the executive official (or a designated representative of the PSA's school (Bylaw 13.1.7.1).

A coach may not contact a PSA before an athletic competition in which the prospect is a participant during the day or days (tournaments) of competition (13.1.7.2.a).

Contact may not be made after a competition until the appropriate school releases the PSA official.

During "Quiet Periods" coaches may contact PSAs only on the Purdue University campus. A PSA may not be evaluated during the Quiet Periods.

Contact Interpretation

Football & basketball coaches may speak at meetings or banquets outside the recruiting contact periods (except for DEAD PERIODS), if the coaches do not make a recruiting presentation and do not have direct contact with any PSA in attendance. Coaches of all other sports may speak at such meetings under the same limitations (Bylaws 3.1.9.b2 and 13.1.9.c2).

Recruiting Materials

It is not permissible to send a prospect recruiting materials (including general correspondence related to athletics) until September 1, at the beginning of the PSA's junior year in high school (Bylaw 13.4.1).

Facsimiles and E-mail may be sent to a prospect (Bylaw 13.4.1.d). (Faxes and e-mail are not considered telephone calls.)

Only those items listed in Bylaw 13.4.1 may be sent to prospects. It is important that the contents of NCAA Bylaw 13.4.1.1(a-h) be carefully reviewed prior to any decision to mail materials to a PSA.

Recruiting Video/Audio Materials

NCAA Division I institutions should note that pursuant to NCAA Bylaw 13.4.2.4, an institution may produce a computer recruiting presentation (e.g., using presentation software) to show to a prospective student-athlete during an in-home visit or during an official or unofficial visit. The presentations may not include any video/audio component except for a highlight film/videotape/audio tape (as permitted by Bylaw 13.4.2.1) and any features (e.g., sound effects, animation) that are included with the presentation software program. Therefore any highlight film/videotape/audio tape incorporated into the recruiting presentation may include only clips of actual athletics contests and activities that occur on the day of the contest that are directly related to the contest (e.g., pregame player introductions, half-time band and cheerleader performances, locker-room talks, crowd reactions, sideline coaching staff activities, post-game on-field award presentations). The highlight film may not include clips of other activities that are only indirectly related to the contests (e.g., team travel, team meals, entertainment activities, practice activities, institutional facilities). However, it is permissible to include still photographs of activities not directly related to a contest in the recruiting presentation. Lastly, a computer recruiting presentation may not be created by an entity outside the institution.

Telephone Contact

In all sports other than football and basketball, one telephone call to a prospect or a prospect's relatives or legal guardians may be made during March of the prospect's junior year in high school. In sports other than football and basketball, subsequent telephone calls to a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians may not be made before July 1 following the completion of the prospect's junior year in high school (subject to the exceptions below); thereafter, **staff members shall not make such telephone calls more than once per week (Bylaw 13.1.3.1).**

Football Telephone Call (Bylaw 13.1.3.1.1)

One telephone call to a prospect or a prospect's relatives or legal guardians may be made during the month of May of the prospect's junior year in high school. Additional telephone calls to a prospect or a prospect's relatives or legal guardians may not be made prior to September 1 of the beginning of the prospect's senior year in high school; thereafter, such telephone contact is limited to once per week outside of a contact period.

Coaches and staff may receive calls from a PSA at the prospect's expense at any time including prior to July 1 (August 15 in football) following the PSA's junior year in high school (Bylaw 13.1.3.2.2).

It is permissible for a graduate assistant coach to make telephone calls to prospective student-athletes, provided the coach has successfully completed the coaches certification examination per Bylaw 11.5.1.1 (Bylaw 11.01.4.g).

Prospects **may not** use a toll free 1-800 number of an institution until after July 1, following completion of their junior year.

Football Exception

Coaches may make unlimited calls to a PSA during the 48-hour period prior to and the 48 hours after 7 a.m. on the initial signing date of the National Letter of Intent (Bylaw 13.1.3.3.2.1).

Basketball Telephone Call (Bylaw 13.1.3.1.2)

In men's basketball, an institution is permitted to make one telephone call per month to a prospect or the prospect's parents or legal guardians on or after June 15 of the prospect's sophomore year in high school through July 31 of the prospect's junior year in high school. An institution is permitted to make two telephone calls to a prospect or the prospect's parents or legal guardians beginning August 1 prior to the prospect's senior year in high school. An institution is permitted to make one telephone call per week to a two-year college prospect or the prospect's parents or legal guardians.

In women's basketball, one telephone call to a prospect or the prospect's parents or legal guardians may be made during each of the months of April and May of the prospect's junior year in high school. One call may be made on or after June 1 through June 20 and one call may be made on or after June 21 through June 30 of the prospect's junior year in high school. In addition, only three telephone calls to a prospect or the prospect's parents or legal guardians may be made during the month of July following the prospect's junior year in high school, with no more than one telephone call per week; thereafter, staff members shall not make such telephone calls more than once per week.

All sport coaches may make unlimited telephone calls during the five days immediately preceding a PSA's Official Visit (Bylaw 13.1.3.3.1).

On the initial day for signing of the National Letter of Intent and during the two days immediately following the initial signing date (Bylaw 13.1.3.3.2).

Off-Campus Contact Exception — Institutional staff members may make unlimited telephone calls to a PSA on the day a permissible, in-person, off-campus contact occurs (Bylaw 13.1.3.3.4).

Academic Advisors — It is permissible for academic advisors (university and athletic department) to make calls to or receive calls from football PSAs related to admissions or academic issues, subject to any applicable limits on the number of calls an institution may place to a prospect (Bylaw 13.1.3.4.1.2).

Restrictions on Off-Campus Recruiting

A member of the Purdue University athletics staff or a representative of its athletics interest (booster) shall not recruit a prospect except as permitted by NCAA, the institution and the Big Ten Conference (NCAA 13.01.3).

Only those coaches who have been NCAA Certified may contact or evaluate any PSA off-campus. Certification must occur on an annual basis (NCAA Bylaws 11.5.1.1, 13.01.4).

Who can Recruit...

Coaches may recruit on- and off-campus in their sports, so long as the recruitment occurs during permissible times. Phone calls may be made to prospects after July 1, following the PSA’s junior year in high school.

Guidelines for Issuing Initial Tenders

A National Letter of Intent (NLI) must be issued with an initial tender. The provisions of the NLI require an NLI be issued with an initial tender for one academic year (or for the remainder of the academic year for junior college football transfers). The initial tender must be signed within 14 days of issuance within the specified NLI signing periods.

An initial tender may be issued without a National Letter of Intent. An institution may issue a tender without a National Letter of Intent only during the applicable signing periods of a sport, or after all opportunities to sign an NLI have expired. It is not permissible to issue (i.e., cannot send or provide) an initial tender without an NLI between early and late signing periods. **The tender must be issued, signed, and validated no later than the first day of classes.**

An initial tender may be issued to midyear enrollees, but not an NLI. The provisions of the NLI do not allow an NLI to be issued to a midyear enrollee for winter or spring terms unless the prospect is a junior college transfer in football. Prospects who are midyear enrollees may be issued a tender without an NLI by attending the first day of class, and on that same day, the institution would have the tender issued, signed and validated.

Offers of initial tenders are limited to the number of tenders that if all were accepted, are within the NCAA grant-in-aid limits for that sport. An institution may offer a previously issued initial tender to another prospect under the following conditions:

- A prospect is notified in writing that admission has been denied to the institution.
- The institution notifies the prospect in writing that the prospect will be ineligible to receive financial aid and the tender will not be valid by the first day of classes based on final certification from the Clearinghouse or as determined by the Registrar's office.
- The institution has received notification that the prospect has signed with another institution.
- The amount of aid offered in an initial tender may be modified when a prospect does not sign an NLI and initial tender during early signing period and the institution is re-issuing the NLI and tender during a later signing period.
- The penalty is based on the signing of a tender, and not on the actual receipt of aid. The penalty does not apply if the prospect is not admissible or if the institution drops the sport in which the prospect or student-athlete participates.

Compliance Procedures for National Letter of Intent and Tender Requests

- Head coach prepares tender request and turns in to the Compliance Office.
- Compliance Office prepares tender and NLI.
 - NLI and Tender copies returned to head coach for review and approval.
 - If all correct, head coach will initial in designated space and return to Compliance Office for mailing.
 - If changes are needed, head coach will indicate and return

to Compliance Office for changes and mailing.

- Mailing instruments (1st class or express) will be prepared by the Compliance Office and charged to the sport account. (Signed documents should be returned to the Compliance Office and **not the sport office.**)
- Signed documents received by Compliance Office will be logged into a tracking sheet.
- If a sport receives a fax copy for immediate confirmation, **a copy must be forwarded to the Compliance Office prior to any information released to media.**
- Information will be logged and is then ready for final steps and distribution.
- The Compliance Office will notify the head coach of receipt of signed documents.
- **APR will submit a copy of each press release to the Compliance Office for review and approval.** (Compliance staff must sign off.)
- Compliance Office will distribute NLI and Tender copies to the Big Ten and DFA.
