Tammy Loew:

Tammy welcomed everyone and mentioned that the CCBRC has been meeting for three years with the mission of working together to address high-risk drinking.

Trista Anderson & Kyle Acker:

Trista and Kyle announced their efforts to raise money for Hurricane Katrina and the Live-Aid concert. They will be approaching the bars to discuss bar cover charges to raise funds and will be selling t-shirts as well.

Smoking Issues Discussion:

- Nancy Maylath presented some student data supporting an increased interest in attending bars if they were smoke-free.
- Nick Vukas, owner of the Knickerbocker and Nicks, is not comfortable moving forward with an ordinance if Lafayette and County don't participate as well.
- Chad Krockover, Ruby Tuesday manager, discussed their decision to become a smoke-free establishment and how it hasn't negatively impacted business. They lose one-two patrons per week because of their decision; most patrons are vocally happy with the decision. He asked whether we want to be a community of followers or leaders.
- Tammy Loew presented some comments from a Bloomington bar owner. Some recommendations:
 - It isn't fair to restaurants with bars to have to be included in an ordinance and exempt bars
 - He hasn't had any revenue issues (business is the same as it was before the ordinance)
 - His own health has improved since the ordinance has gone into effect.
 - The biggest complainers are those who have a tendency to violate alcohol-related laws.
 - It took a few weeks to transition to it, but by and large, it's a non-issue.

- They have had some issues with an increase in cigarette butts on the sidewalks. The City of Bloomington is purchasing urns to put out in front of businesses.
- Patti O'Callaghan presented a draft ordinance, which generated a lot of feedback and discussion. She mentioned the importance of getting both economic and health data, including air quality; it will be filed for the November 7th meeting and would take effect July 1, 2006.
