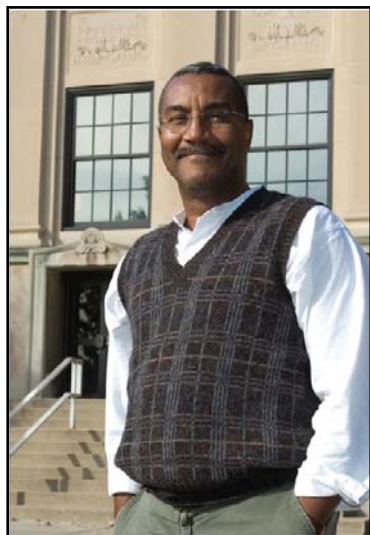

Professor Joe Francisco to present the McCoy Distinguished Lecture



Last spring, Joe Francisco was selected to receive the 2007 Herbert Newby McCoy Award. The McCoy Award is given to a student or faculty member in the science departments of Purdue University making the greatest contribution of the year to science. Since the first award was

conferred in the spring of 1965, it has remained the most prestigious research award given by the University in the science area. The McCoy Distinguished Lecture is scheduled for 3:30 pm on Wednesday, October 10, in Fowler Hall. I encourage all EAS students, faculty and staff to attend the lecture and the reception honoring Professor Francisco.

Terry West completed the year as President of the Association of Environmental and Engineering Geologists (AEG) at the Association's annual meeting in Los Angeles, California on September 25-30, 2007. There were more than 700 registrants at the meeting held at the Sheraton Universal hotel. This was the 50th anniversary of AEG and several

special events were scheduled, including a field trip to an excavated trench across the San Andreas fault.

AEG lists over 3400 geologists in its membership. 325 abstracts were presented at the conference and the banquet hosted 300 participants. Dr. West was presented with a Past Presidents pin and a large wall clock to commemorate his year of service as President of the Association. He also visited 17 of the 25 sections of AEG during his term as President.

NATIONAL CYBER SECURITY AWARENESS MONTH

Don't be scared, October is National Cyber Security Awareness Month. ITaP's Networks and Security group will be hosting discussions on how to use the internet safely, and what the future of cybersecurity holds. NATIONAL PHYSICAL SCIENCE CONSORTIUM FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

The National Physical Science Consortium (NPSC) is a unique partnership of industry, government and

higher education. NPSC offers two related programs; each uses the same online application.

- 1) **A two-phase, six-year fellowship.** Initial support is for two or three years. If progress is satisfactory and the conditions of the award are maintained, support may continue for a total of up to six years. Students typically apply while seniors in college.
- 2) **A dissertation support program.** Students should apply in the year prior to the beginning of their dissertation research program, but not until they can describe their research at least in general terms.

Students may apply starting in late August; the process closes in early November (see website for exact dates). The Fellowship covers tuition and fees and provides a generous annual stipend. Students in the six-year program intern for two summers with their sponsor, who provides a salary and covers travel expenses. For students who receive six years of support, the total value of the Fellowship well exceeds \$200,000.

END OF SEMESTER DEADLINES

October 12, 2007 – last day for students who registered for exam/degree only for the Fall 2007 session to submit to the Graduate School a positive report of the final examination and a thesis receipt form.

December 1, 2007 – is the last day for degree candidates to pass their final examinations.

December 3, 2007 – signed candidate audit/certification forms should be returned back to the Graduate School as soon as possible, but no later than this date.

December 3, 2007 – final examination report forms must be received for all graduating students by the Graduate School, Room 170, Young Hall (YONG). Students for whom a final report form is not received will not be able to graduate in December.

December 7, 2007 – Ph.D. candidates must submit their dissertation via Electronic Thesis Deposit (ETD). Ph.D. candidates must also turn in all required forms at their mandatory, scheduled, final deposit appointment in the Thesis/Dissertation Office, Room 170, Young Hall (YONG).

December 7, 2007 – Master's candidates must deposit one bound copy of their thesis at their mandatory, scheduled, final deposit appointment in the Thesis/Dissertation Office, Room 170, Young Hall (YONG).

Master's and Ph.D. candidates with "Confidential" theses/dissertations must also submit their departmental copies to the Graduate School. Deposit appointments can be made by calling 765-494-2600, or email gradinfo@purdue.edu.
