

University Senate Newsletter First Meeting, September 13, 2021, Virtual

Senate Chair's Remarks:

Chair Beaudoin stated that the "2021-22 Senate theme" would be "Value." He listed a number of matters which he hoped the Senate would prioritize in its work this year. These were: sexual assault prevention and support for survivors; mental health support and initiatives; and diversity and equity across campus.

He also stated that the Senate would "provide value, in a timely manner to our administration and Trustee partners" on the following issues: supporting/encouraging teaching excellence; successful implementation of a January Term; feedback on the issue of grade inflation; assessment for critical thinking skills in Purdue students; and encouraging a better approach to healthcare.

Purdue President's Remarks:

President Daniels presented census data for our 2021 student population. All figures showed new highs. While Purdue had targeted the number of 8,450 first-year students, the yield turned out to be 10,191. Domestic non-resident yield increased 3% over 2020 levels. Purdue currently has 49,636 students, representing an 8.2% increase over Fall 2020, and a 48% increase from 2014.

Students indicated that their selection of Purdue had been driven by Purdue's national prominence during the pandemic, including its decision to be inperson during 2020-21, as well as its reputation for high quality combined with affordability.

Purdue also saw a record number of traditionally underserved minority students, including a 109% increase (to 1135) in the first-year class. In addition, BA/BS graduation rates have increased to 65% over four years of enrollment, while time to graduate degree is holding relatively steady around 5 years. A comprehensive study of classroom spaces and strategic planning for their optimization is underway during 2021-22.

Purdue President's Remarks (continued):

President Daniels also indicated that preventative health measures are an important goal for the coming year, and that new incentives for common preventative health measures, better communication about screenings, and a simpler Healthy Boiler portal were on the way.
