

University Senate Newsletter Sixth Meeting, March 21, 2022, Virtual

Senate Chair's Remarks:

Chair Beaudoin presented an update on the work of the special committee convened to address sexual violence on campus. Two rounds of recommendations have been made to the university. Actions to be taken include: more resources and modules available for education on sexual violence; additional staff and support for the CARE Center; and the timely warning language required by the Clery Act will be modified to be more supportive of survivors. Ongoing efforts continue to improve the process for reporting, and student organizations will work to expand the Sober Drivers program.

Chair Beaudoin also reported 604 faculty had responded regarding the possibility of a faculty lounge or club; most respondents were tenured or tenure-track. Most respondents were supportive of the idea, with highest interest levels for lunch and happy hour uses for the area. Overwhelming support was reported for the idea that any instructors in the university should be allowed to use such an area.

Finally, he noted that Alpine Clinic, one of the largest mental health providers in the area, recently closed its doors without much notice, badly exacerbating the shortage of mental health professionals in West Lafayette. Resources available to Purdue insurance users include the Center for Healthy Living and LiveHealthOnline.

Purdue President's Remarks:

President Daniels was unable to attend the Senate meeting, but Provost Akridge was available to address questions sent in advance of the meeting. Related to the arrest of Adonis Tuggle, no decision has yet been made by the special prosecutor in his investigation, and so no new information, including the bodycam footage, may be released yet. As soon as the University is in a position to provide updates, they will do so.

Another question was about Purdue's ability to manage rising inflation in light of the latest year of tuition freeze. Provost Akridge explained that we revisit the issue of tuition annually. While tuition has been frozen, we have grown enrollment, and so we have been able to invest in our faculty, research enterprises, and in equity matters. Our merit pool this year will be 4%, which will be at or near the top of our peers, with 1% held back as a targeted competitive adjustment pool. Graduate student stipends and some faculty and staff groups need to be more competitive, and will be the focus of that pool.
