LGBTQ Film Series: Equality U

Equality U is a feature-length documentary following a group of 33 young activists on the Soulforce Equality Ride, a first of its kind, two-month, cross-country tour to confront anti-gay discrimination policies at 19 conservative religious and military colleges. It is a story of a group of young people struggling to stand up for what they believe is right. Against the backdrop of the Equality Ride, the film focuses on seven of the 'Equality Riders' and two courageous students they encounter along their journey. And while most of the young Riders identify as Christian, not all of them do so in the same way, if at all. At each stop, the Riders exercise 'relentless non-violent resistance' and often face arrest for trespassing. They must confront the controversial question: 'Do schools ultimately have the right to decide who does and doesn't belong?' But even in the most seemingly unwelcoming campuses, the Riders find straight students who are interested in a dialogue. Can this small group of activists sow the seeds of dialogue as their bus rolls down the highway? How will the road change them? For the Riders that identify as both

Queer and Christian, how will the journey challenge or transform their faith? And what happens to the outed gay students they encounter and then leave behind? Run time: 90 minutes

We're creating an exciting future developing capabilities for the next generation to explore space, partnering with industry to expand commercial access to space for crew and cargo, and are involved in many other missions exploring earth, the solar system and the universe beyond.

At JSC, you'll have the opportunity to contribute to our continued work of building a new NASA vehicle to enable human deep space exploration, work on the operation and development of the International Space Station in cooperation with our Internal Partners, and work with industry to help foster the commercial space sector. Business Positions

Pathways Business Interns typically work in either the Office of Procurement or the Office of the Chief Financial Officer (OCFO). In the Office of Procurement, you'll be involved in contracts management for JSC - assisting in soliciting, negotiating, and awarding of the many contracts critical to the operation of our Center. The OCFO is the Center's focal point for financial planning and budget execution. In the OCFO, you'll have the opportunity to work in the Financial Management Division, responsible for all of our Financial and Accounting activities, or our Resource Offices that partner with organizations at the Center to plan, manage and execute their budget and resources plans. Additionally, there are a limited number of opportunities in the External Relations Office, our Information Resources Directorate and our Human Resources Office. These mission support organizations provide JSC with critical support essential to the success of our programs, projects and organizations. - Assist in procurement of ground and flight hardware

As a Pathways Engineering Intern at JSC, you'll work in either our Engineering Directorate – involved in the design, testing, and building of hardware; or our Flight Operations Directorate – involved in mission planning, training crews and flight control teams, and executing missions real time on-console in Mission Control. Here are a few specific examples of the exciting work you can be a part of as a Pathways Engineering Intern at JSC:

- Designing the next generation of spacecraft
- Developing robotics hardware and software that will support missions beyond lower-Earth orbit
- Providing real-time flight control during International Space Station Missions
- Analyzing materials from meteorites, other planets, and the Moon
- Working with our International Partners
- Designing the next generation of I/T systems and networks
- Providing engineering support for JSC facilities
- Designing hardware for future Mars missions
