



A Good Day To Die

On this day in 1973, approximately 200 Oglala Lakota activists and AIM (American Indian Movement) members occupied Wounded Knee on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. One side would label this as the "largest civil disorder in the history of the Marshals Services" (U.S. Marshals Service) while the other side would see this as a fight for Native American democracy. 
