



Retention of Fall 2006 First-Time, Full-time Students





• 55% of Fall 2007 full-time undergraduates received financial aid of some type including need-based loans, work study, and non need-based scholarships.


Annual Need-Based Scholarships & Grants

Annual Need-Based Loans


• 37% of Fall 2007 full-time undergraduates received need-based work-study and/or loans (not including parent loans); the average loan for the year was \$4,579.

The Boilermaker Community

As a Purdue student, you have more than classroom- and homework-based academic challenges; you also have unmatched opportunities to participate in research, internships, and other co-curricular and service-learning activities. In recent years, the University has added exceptional new buildings, research facilities, acclaimed faculty, and scholarship funds as a result of the University's successful fund-raising campaign. Not surprisingly, a Purdue education is respected worldwide. Students from 124 countries represent the second highest international enrollment among public universities in the United States, and Purdue students are encouraged to study abroad. In addition, Boilermaker students have access to a superior University housing system, more than 815 student organizations, the excitement of Big Ten athletics, and a variety of entertainment options both on campus and in the Lafayette and West Lafayette communities. A survey of May 2007 graduates indicates that their Purdue education had equipped them well, as evidenced by the fact that within six months of graduation 98 percent of them were employed, were continuing their education, or had other confirmed plans.



Student Experiences and Perceptions

Students who are actively involved in their own learning and development are more likely to be successful in college. Colleges and universities offer students a wide variety of opportunities both inside and outside the classroom to become engaged with new ideas, people, and experiences. Institutions measure the effectiveness of these opportunities in a variety of ways to better understand what types of activities and programs students find the most helpful.

In addition, institutions participating in the VSA program measure student involvement on campus using one of four national surveys. Results from the one survey are reported for a common set of questions selected as part of VSA. Following are the selected results from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE). The questions have been grouped together in categories that are known to contribute to student learning and development. The results reported below are based on the responses of seniors who participated in the survey.

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Student Learning Outcomes

All colleges and universities use multiple approaches to measure student learning. Many of these are specific to particular disciplines, many are coordinated with accrediting agencies, and many are based on outcomes after students have graduated. In addition, those institutions participating in the VSA measure increases in critical thinking, analytic reasoning, and written communication using one of three tests.

Student Learning Assessment at Purdue

Purdue University has a learning outcomes assessment process in place that focuses faculty on key elements and principles of effective learning outcomes assessment. The Process involves 1) defining learning outcomes, 2) identifying learning activities aimed at helping students achieve the learning outcome, 3) collecting evidence related to students' achievement of the learning outcome, 4) determining the extent to which students are achieving the learning outcome, 5) reviewing the assessment evidence to improve student learning, 6) identifying specific changes to help students achieve an acceptable or higher level of the learning outcome, and 7) monitoring the impact of changes on students' achievement of the learning outcome.
