





Where is Turkey Run State Park?

IFP students and their hosts were asked in a recent travel survey what their favorite place was in Indiana, or a place they would like to visit in the future. Turkey Run State Park ranked 1st place!

This Indiana gem is located at 8121 Park Road in Marshall, Indiana, about 75 minutes from West Lafayette. It boasts a breathtaking gorge system that was naturally formed by the drainage of the creek.

A system of trails provides even the most avid hikers a challenge! Turkey Run's Trail 3 is known for its ruggedness, providing a challenge just off of the beaten path.
