During this evening of interactive learning, Carlito Camahalan Amalla will introduce his home community's art and tradition of embroidery through storytelling. For the Agusanon Manobos, embroidered clothing is "second skin" and a camas for the expression and passing on of cultural heritage. The storytelling will be followed by a dance workshop for those interested in knowing about the Agusanon Manobos through rhythm and movement.

The guest artist, Carlito Camahalan Amalla, is a member of the Manobo Indigenous Peoples of Agusan, Southern Philippines. He teaches at the De La Salle College of Saint Benilde in Manila, and is a resident performer at the University of the Philippines' theatrical and gamelan group. He obtained his masters in Art History from the University of the Philippines. His scholarship on Agusanon Manobo embroidery has appeared in the Cultural Center of the Philippines' "Encyclopedia of Philippine Art." He is a puppeter, dancer, musician, and bearer and ambassador of cultural heritage. He has exhibited worldwide as a multimedia artist.






