



Dr. Sagar is an Associate Professor of English at the College of Liberal Arts specializing in Postcolonial literature. Her areas of research include Urban space, domesticity and cultural commodities in Africa and South Asia, postcolonial- and feminist-cultural studies, theory, literature and film, third world cities/citizenship; discourses of gifts and sacrifice in the imperial encounter; memory and speed culture; and taste and distinction (aestheticism and consumerism in a transnational context).

Featured Student Research

Sarah Huang

Hi! I'm Sarah Huang and I'm a PhD candidate in the Department of Anthropology and the Ecological Sciences and Engineering Program. My research interests are aimed at creating more just and equitable food systems. For my dissertation, I conducted research in southern Vietnam where I studied the impacts of agricultural development and food security on rice farmers' livelihoods. In this work, I show underlying contradictions in how governments address food security, or the ability to create secure futures. I focus on how Vietnamese rice farmers create and define what is necessary for their future as a model for how governments and other agencies can approach addressing global food security. I am also the Food and Agriculture Editor at Hyphen magazine, a news and culture magazine for Asian Americans. Check us out!

"Different Shades of Me Live & In Color" Friday, December 6, 2019 Time: 7PM


Location: Loeb Playhouse

ASAM 240/AMST 301: Introduction to Asian American Studies



Who are Asian Americans? This course will cover the historical and contemporary experiences of Asian Americans in the United States. We will address these four major themes: 1) the theories of ethnicity and race in the U.S.; 2) pre- and post-1960s Asian immigration; 3) the Asian American movement and the birth of the 'pan-ethnic' Asian American identity; and 4) contemporary Asian American sociopolitical issues.

ASAM 340/AMST 301: CONTEMPORARY ISSUES IN ASIAN AMERICAN STUDIES

RELIGION AND CHINESE SOCIETY

Introduction

This course provides an overview of various religions in contemporary China, examines religiosity at the micro, meso and macro levels, and discusses the mutual impacts between religion and social, cultural and political life in Chinese societies.

The core readings cover beliefs, practices, and social aspects of the major religions in China (Buddhism, Christianity, Daoism, and Islam) and popular spiritual practices such as feng-shui, qigong (chi-kung), and kung-fu (martial arts).

We also assess the roles that government policies play in suppressing or facilitating religious growth.



EDCI 61200 Seminar in Literacy: Bilingualism & Multilingualism Spring 2020: Tuesdays 5:30 – 8:20 pm

This course examines theories, research and educational practices in bilingualism and multilingualism. Participants will become familiar with major conceptual and methodological issues in research about the use and acquisition of two or more languages in bi/multilingual societal and educational contexts. Individual and societal dimensions will be considered through the examination of a wide range of approaches. Accordingly, the course is transdisciplinary in nature, bringing together work from anthropology, education, psychology, and (socio)linguistics. This course is designed to allow doctoral and advanced masters students to develop and deepen their understanding of a wide-range of issues related to bilingualism and multilingualism. Students will have the flexibility for their final project to write a book review for publication, to write a literature review to explore a specific topic in more depth, or to do preliminary research prior to the thesis or dissertation and write a research paper.


Stories as Souvenirs: Life After Study Abroad
