

One World One Purdue: International Education Week





Featured Faculty Member

Dr. Kihara is a full professor in the Department of Biological Sciences and the Department of Computer Science at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana. He received a B.S. degree from the University of Tokyo, Japan in 1994, and a Ph.D. degree from Kyoto University, Japan in 1999. After studying as a postdoctoral researcher with Prof. Jeffrey Skolnick he joined Purdue University in 2003. He was promoted to full professor in 2014. From 2018, he holds an adjunct professor position at the Department of Pediatrics, University of Cincinnati. He has been working on various topics in protein bioinformatics. His




current research projects include the developments of algorithms for protein-protein docking, protein tertiary structure prediction, structure modeling from low-resolution image data, structure- and sequence-based protein function prediction, and computational drug design. He has published over 160 research articles, which are published in journals including Nature Methods, Nature Communications, and Science. His research projects have been constantly supported by grants from the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, and industry. He has served on the program committee of numerous bioinformatics conferences, including the Intelligent Systems for Molecular Biology (ISMB) where he was a track chair in 2019. In 2013, he was named a University Faculty Scholar by Purdue University.

Who are Asian Americans? This course will cover the historical and contemporary experiences of Asian Americans in the United States. RELIGION AND CHINESE SOCIETY

Introduction

This course provides an overview of various religions in contemporary China, examines religiosity at the micro, meso and macro levels, and discusses the mutual impacts between religion and social, cultural and political life in Chinese societies.

The core readings cover beliefs, practices, and social aspects of the major religions in China (Buddhism, Christianity, Daoism, and Islam) and popular spiritual practices such as feng-shui, qigong (chi-kung), and kung-fu (martial arts).

We also assess the roles that government policies play in suppressing or facilitating religious growth.
