  2. Complete all mini-exercises (70 points). When instructed to bring a document, please bring a hardcopy. There are 7 mini-exercises (ME), each is worth 10 points, and six of the MEs are date specific. Students select the remaining ME from two options and submit no later than 11/13/15:

  (a) write a news story for the *Aging Exchange* about a recent research accomplishment (could be
  - research done by you, your major professor, or another CALC faculty associate); (b) write a brief critique (≤ 250 words) of a CALC colloquium presentation or one of the speakers at the symposium on 10/2/15.
