Foundations in Homeland Security

This course addresses Homeland Security and focuses on how Homeland Security is conducted, how the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) operates, and how the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) pushes resources forward to combat natural and man-made disasters.

Focusing on the Fifteen National Planning Scenarios and Fifteen Emergency Support functions, this course also discusses preparation, response, and recovery under the new National Response Framework. Further, it illuminates how the Incident Command System of America works, and how the National Incident Management System mitigates disasters. Lastly, terrorism and how America copes with the global war on terrorism is discussed in detail. Selected guest speakers from Federal agencies abound and two planned trips to Homeland Security operations are conducted.
