Umit Karabiyik, Assistant Professor, Computer Information Technology presented information about Human Rights Violations in Turkey. His slides are attached. Umit does not identify as a Human Rights activist but rather interested in helping others and his country. He focused on activities following the July 15 2016 attempted coup. Approximately 130,000 public servants have been dismissed from their positions including academics, teachers, healthcare workers, judges and lawyers. In this process they have also been wither jailed or banned from professional practice. Many questions were asked and Guity noted a parallel between this experience and what occurred in Iran in 1979. The discussions continued far into the next hour.
