Major of the Month: Wildlife

Located within Purdue's Department of Forestry and Natural Resources, the Wildlife major is ideal for students with a broad interest in environmental sustainability and protecting ecological habitats for wildlife. Students in this major take a variety of applied, hands-on courses including field identification, natural resource management, ecology of mammal and birds, and spatial ecology. Graduates of the program often go on to careers in government, non-profit, and environmental agencies as biologists, wildlife technicians, naturalists, geographic information systems specialists, fish and game wardens, and more. This major would strongly appeal to students who love science and enjoy working outdoors, and as one of the smaller majors on campus, students enjoy smaller class sizes, greater access to professors and researchers, and a tight knit community within the Wildlife cohort. The department also offers a Wildlife minor for students interested in complementing their primary major.
