<u>Dropping a Class:</u> August 25 – September 8 No authorization required. Student may drop course via Scheduling Assistant (course not recorded).

September 9 – November 25 Advisor permission required. Grade of "W" recorded. Submit using Scheduling Assistant.

Major of the Month: College of Liberal Arts - Degree Plus

Are you interested in fields like history, political science, English, or Anthropology? Perhaps you're considering pursuing a major in the College of Liberal Arts but also interested in STEM or business majors. With Purdue's Degree Plus program, you can do both! By streamlining the double majoring processing and waiving some core requirements, Degree Plus gives you the opportunity to work toward simultaneous undergraduate degrees in the College of Liberal Arts and another school or college-without doubling your time at college nor your tuition. Go for two with the Degree Plus program!

Forming Good Habits:

With many of you starting your first semester of college, it's more important than ever to form good habits early. You may find that your day is far less structured than it was in high school, leading to a greater sense of freedom and independence. We first recommend checking out the many resources at the <u>Academic Success Center (ASC)</u>, but here are some additional tips to help keep you on track and have a successful first semester.

- 1. Establish a routine. Although you have an official class schedule, you'll want to develop your own overall schedule. This includes waking up and going to bed at a consistent time and building in scheduled study time. Remember, you should be devoting 2 hours of work outside of class for every hour you spend in class. That's 30 hours of studying, if you have a 15-credit course load.
- 2. Identify when and where you are most productive. Do you study best at night or during the day? Do you prefer quiet areas, or do you like background noise? Once you get a feel for when and how you're most productive, build study times and locations into your schedule. Consider using a productivity app like Forest to help you stay focused.
- 3. Stay organized. In the first week of classes, look at your syllabus and write down all your major assignments and exams on a paper or digital planner. SHOVEL is a real time college planner app free for all students. With SHOVEL you can enter your course requirements, co-curricular commitments, employment hours and be able to balance your time so that you can also schedule breaks and downtime. Often times, your assignments across classes will have similar due dates. This means you'll have weeks with no major projects or exams, followed by another week where everything is due all at once, so time management is important.
- 4. Stay connected to your classes. Log into Brightspace daily and read all communication from your instructors. You should also check your Purdue email frequently. Although each instructor provides a syllabus, due dates and assignments may change. Remember to contact <u>Purdue</u> IT if you have issues with your Brightspace, email account, or Purdue Login.
