

HTM 41100: Hospitality and Tourism Law

Course Description

Overview of the fundamental legal framework that governs the conduct of hospitality and tourism managers. Topics include civil rights, contracts, court procedures, ethics, and risk management.

Recall the basic court procedures, negotiation, mediation, civil rights issues and contract law.

Recall the legal principles relevant to negligence and the many cases that define the scope of obligations and liability.

Describe and analyze legal and ethical relationships with guests, other patrons, and suppliers.

Identify, comprehend, and analyze special topics within hospitality law, including food and alcohol liability, travel agent relationships, employment issues, franchising, copyright and trademarks, licensing and casino law.

Describe the dynamics of risk management.
