Health News Sources

As you prepare for a career in healthcare, it is a good idea to keep up with news in the profession. You will especially need this as you ready yourself for interviews. Also remember that many professional journals are available at a discounted price for students. You can sign up for regular delivery of news items at the following sites for free:

- <u>Kaiser Family Foundation</u>—specializes in health policy analysis. You can specify the areas that most interest you. Many good reports—especially about insurance issues. The state health facts section is also interesting to play with. https://www.kff.org
- U.S. Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion offers information on health issues through Health.gov. Also at this site is the calendar of National Health Observances. Just when is National People Who Sneeze a Lot Awareness Day? If it existed, it would be there. https://health.gov/
- Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (the MMWR) is a highly regarded publication of the Centers for Disease Control. This
 is where "reportable diseases" like AIDS and mumps are noted. CDC has also created a new MMWR app. You can use the
