

Research Security and Export Controls

International Activity Briefing

While international activities are essential to scientific progress, they can also pose security risks that must be carefully managed. When establishing new partnerships, ensure you understand your collaborators' funding sources and data-sharing agreements to mitigate risks such as intellectual property theft and undue foreign influence. The Assessing Risk Prior to International Engagements and Federal Risk Assessment Matrices documents offer insight into evaluating potential risks.

INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL

Before traveling, please review <u>RSEC's international travel webpage</u> for general guidance and risk mitigation strategies. Be aware that customs officials may search or seize electronic devices. Theft or loss of property is also a common risk during travel, which can compromise sensitive data. To protect your information:

- Carry only necessary data and contacts
- Back up essential files and store copies securely at Purdue.
- Refer to <u>U.S. Customs</u> and <u>ODNI</u> resources for travel security.

If you are traveling to a <u>high-risk destination</u> and require a laptop, you should <u>submit a request</u> for a clean loaner laptop from Purdue IT. If you are traveling to any other country, and are taking any Purdue equipment, items, or software, other than your laptop with standard university software, please reach out to RSEC so we can assess it for export control purposes.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES

Academic conferences provide valuable networking and learning opportunities but also present potential risks. These events offer an open environment where both traditional and non-traditional collectors can establish business and social connections, gain access to technologies or prototypes, and engage with subject matter experts. Foreign governments may also use conferences to identify and evaluate individuals for potential recruitment into Maign Foreign Talent Recruitment Programs. Staying aware of these risks can help you navigate conferences safely while protecting your research.

FEDERAL FUNDING DISCLOSURES

As a general reminder, if you are involved in federally funded research, ensure your *Current & Pending (Other) Support* disclosures are up to date. The attached *NSTC Common Disclosure Table* outlines activities that require reporting. NIH awards may require *Foreign Component* reporting. Consult <u>Sponsored Programs Services</u> for guidance on federal disclosure requirements.
