University begins work on next strategic plan

Purdue retirees are actively involved in helping the University craft its next strategic plan.

Betty Suddarth, president of the Purdue University Retirees Association, is a member of one of the eight strategic plan working groups, and several retirees have taken part in open forums in which the working groups gain input from the University community.

Victor Lechtenberg, interim provost, and George Bodner, chair of the University Senate, serve as co-chairs of the Strategic Planning Steering Committee. Each of the eight working groups is focusing on a key area: student success and the student experience; large-scale research and its infrastructure; economic development; quality of life in the workplace; globalization; campus design; synergies between science/engineering and liberal arts/social sciences; and attracting students to careers in the STEM disciplines -- science, technology, engineering and math.

Suddarth, who serves on the campus design group, says the experience has been rewarding.

"The University has been very generous in allowing and inviting retirees

From your Benefits Committee

Here is news and some updates from the PURA Benefits Committee and chair Martha Chiscon.

1. Those of you who have accessed your PURcare medical or prescription benefits should find no changes for 2008 other than the maximum out-of-pocket before catastrophic coverage under the prescription plan.

2. The one major plan change is to the vision plan. VSP was no longer an option for 2008. Therefore, a set amount of benefit dollars was chosen — \$150. These dollars may be used to offset the cost of any component of your vision exam, prescription lenses, frames, reading glasses, etc. Your vision provider should be able to send a claim to PacifiCare for reimbursement. You will pay amounts above the \$150 benefit. There is no time frame to wait to use this benefit. Even if you used the VSP benefit toward the end of 2007, this new vision benefit is available any time during 2008 that it is needed.

3. You will shortly be receiving a packet of information regarding your prescription drug coverage under PURcare. This information should be accurate this year and provide you useful information about the PURcare prescription benefit. You will also receive your certificate, which describes your medical coverage in detail. Keep this for reference during the year.

4. Should you find that you are unable to satisfactorily resolve a medical, prescription or vision benefit issue by calling the Customer Service 800 number on your plan card, call the Purdue Customer Service staff headed by Kate LaMar at (765) 494-4222. They will be able to resolve complex issues for you.

5. Representatives from PacifiCare will present a program and answer general questions at 2 p.m. Tuesday, March 11, in Room 322, Stewart Center. Those with specific individual questions should call Michele Salla at (765) 494-1779 to schedule an appointment for that afternoon.

to be a part of this process," she says. "We are getting an opportunity to be a part of a very important process for Purdue University."

Information about the strategic planning process is available online at www.purdue.edu/strategic_plan/2007-13.

At that site, there are links to blogs from each of the working groups. Visitors to the site can answer questions posted by the groups and can offer general comments regarding the strategic plan.

"Our goal has been to engage a broad audience through the forums we have had and through the online blog," Lechtenberg

says. "It is critical that we incorporate the voices of people on campus, in the community and across Indiana into our next strategic plan."

Each working group is beginning to draft a white paper on its topic to describe objectives, strategies and actions, funding requirements, and potential sources of funding. The white papers are expected to be completed in February.

Purdue makes up about 15 percent of the community's United Way giving. Retirees were a big part of the Purdue United Way campaign. Betty Suddarth and Scott Rumble were the retiree representatives to Purdue's campaign. In all, retirees contributed \$83,949 to the campaign as of its November celebration.

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Jane Goodall to speak as part of Science Centennial

Tickets were to go on sale Feb. 19 for a presentation by Jane Goodall, a world-renowned humanitarian and primatologist, who will speak at Purdue on March 29.

Goodall's talk, "Reason for Hope," is the College of Science Centennial Finale Event. It will be at 1 p.m. March 29 in Elliott Hall of Music.

Tickets are \$15 for students with a valid student ID and \$21 for the general public. They will be available at Purdue box offices and at Ticketmaster.

Goodall, acclaimed for her work with chimpanzees in the wild, will describe the special relationship she has developed with these animals and share her passion for saving them and their habitat.

Founded in 1977, the Jane Goodall Institute continues Goodall's pioneering research of chimpanzee behavior — research that transformed scientific perceptions of the relationship between humans and animals.

Today, the Institute is a global leader in the effort to protect chimpanzees and their habitats. It also is widely recognized for establishing innovative community-centered conservation and development

programs in Africa, and the Roots & Shoots education program, which has groups in more than 95 countries.
